THE FAILURE OF THE VACCINATION ACTS.

TO THE EDITORS, DUBLIN JOURNAL OF MEDICAL SCIENCE.

SIRS,—In the discussion which occurred recently upon Dr. T. P. C. Kirkpatrick's paper, read before the Section of State Medicine in the Royal Academy of Medicine in Ireland, on January 8th, 1915, and reported in the *Lancet*, February 19, Sir John Moore is reported as having said that he looked upon Dr. C. K. Millard as "sitting on the fence" (presumably between the pro-vaccinists and the anti-vaccinists).

With all deference and respect to Sir John Moore and at the risk of appearing egotistical, may I suggest to him that I am not sitting on a "fence," but on a granite wall; and having succeeded in climbing there after many years of groping, I find my position so secure, and my outlook so much wider and less obscured, that I have certainly no inclination to descend again into either the camp of the pro-vaccinists or that of the antivaccinists.

But surely Sir John Moore cannot seriously think that after I have consistently adhered to my position for twelve years, and after having just published my views in permanent form,* I am still halting between two opinions or, to use his own expression, sitting on the fence!
