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Joseph Maria Bocheński was born in Czusow, Polen, in 1902. He studied jurisprudence at the University of Lemberg (1920-22); economics at the University of Posen (1922-26); philosophy at the University of Fribourg (1928-30), where he acquired a Ph.D.; and theology at the Angelicum in Rome (1930-33), where he acquired a D.D. He was Professor at the Angelicum in Rome (1933-40), at the University of Krakau (1938), and at the University of Fribourg (1945ff.), where he was Dean of the Philosophical Faculty (1950-52) and President (1964-66). He was Director of the *Osteuropäisches Institut* (1957) and Director of the *Ost-Kolleg* in Cologne (1955-65). He was Visiting Professor at the Universities of Notre Dame (Flint Professor), Kansas, Pittsburgh, Alberta, Salzburg, and South Africa. He has received honorary doctorates from the University of Notre Dame (jurisprudence), from the University of Mexico (philosophy), and from the University of S. Cuore in Milan (mathematics). His interests include all core disciplines of philosophy and theology. His most recent work concentrates (again) on Thomas Aquinas. He is the author of numerous philosophical articles and books. Perhaps his most important books are: *Europäische Philosophie der Gegenwart*, 1947; *Formale Logik*, 1956; *Logik der Religion*, 1964.

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Problems of Religious Pluralism, 1985; *An Interpretation of Religion*, 1989, based on the Gifford Lectures for 1986-87; *Disputed Questions*, 1993; etc. He has also written on theological topics in, for example, *The Metaphor of God Incarnate*, 1993. His main research interests are in the epistemology of religion and in the problems of religious pluralism.

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Elena Klevakina-Uljanov was born in Novosibirsk in 1956. From 1973 on she studied at the Pedagogical Institute, Faculty of Foreign Languages, and achieved her diploma with distinction in English and German in 1978. From 1978 to 1981 she was a Lecturer in English at the Medical Institute of the University of Novosibirsk. In 1981 she began her postgraduate studies in philosophy, was a Lecturer in philosophy at the Medical Institute of the University of Novosibirsk from 1983 to 1984, and obtained a master-degree in philosophy in 1984. In 1985 she became a Senior-Teacher in philosophy at the Department of Philosophy of the Pedagogical Institute of the University of Novosibirsk. From 1985 to 1990 she was Dean of the Faculty of Foreign Languages of the University of Novosibirsk, and has been a Docent (Assistant Professor) of Philosophy at the University of Novosibirsk since 1986. During the winter-term 1989/90 and the summer-terms 1990 and 1991 she was Visiting Professor at the Department of Philosophy of the University of Salzburg. Since winter-term 1991/92 she has been Visiting Professor at the Department of Philosophy at the University of Vienna. Her main interests are in epistemology and the history of Russian philosophy. 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Paul Weingartner was born Innsbruck, Austria in 1931. He studied philosophy, physics, mathematics and pedagogics at the University of Innsbruck. Ph.D. 1961, major: philosophy, minor: physics. Postdoctoral studies in London (with K. R. Popper) and in Munich (with Stegmüller). Habilitation on *Basic Questions on the Problem of Truth* (University of Graz, 1965). His research areas are philosophy of science, logic, epistemology and investigations on traditional problems of philosophy with the help of modern tools of logics and mathematics. He is author of two books on philosophy of science and of more than 100 research articles. He is chairman of the Institut für Wissenschaftstheorie (Institute for the Philosophy of Science) at the International Research Center Salzburg (Mönchsberg 2a, A-5020 Salzburg).

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
