A Note on Transliteration

In general, when referring to sources in Ottoman Turkish, I have transliterated into modern Turkish. In a few cases, I have used the Arabic transliteration (for example, *waqf* or *waqfiyya*). In Turkish words, the following characters are pronounced as indicated:

c = "j" as in joke

ç = "ch" as in children

ş = "sh" as in ship

ı = undotted "i", sounds like the "e" of women

ğ = soft g, lengthening the sound of the preceding vowel

ö = sounds like the "u" of fur

ü = like French u
